Chairman's News February 2025



Well, here we are in February, where on earth did January go? You may recall that just last month I suggested that you might want to think about joining a local club or society, but if you don't want that commitment, then you have an option to come and join the Partnership. When I say join, I'm not talking about signing up to a club which requires you to attend weekly, monthly or whatever. What I'm suggesting, is that you get involved in something that we do throughout the year. And what we do varies quite considerably. Most people will

be aware that we organise the **Christmas Market & Fair** in December. But we also organise many other events and activities throughout the year, some of which will only take a few hours in the year, whilst others require a slightly bigger commitment. So, to give you an idea of the sort of things that you could get involved in, I thought I'd just run through some of the activities we are planning to do this year.

Something that we do throughout the year is the **Community Speed Watch** activity on Macclesfield Road. Now you might think that you don't want to get involved in something like this, but we don't do this exercise to catch people speeding. We do it as a deterrent which slows vehicles down and make drivers think about the dangers to pedestrians at this location just next to the entrance to the Victoria Mills Estate. At this location many parents need to cross Macclesfield Road to get to their children to the Hermitage Primary School, but it's a tricky location for both drivers and pedestrians. We have been campaigning for some time to see a **pedestrian crossing** installed, but until one is, we will continue with this activity. We know that this activity on its own, will not get a crossing installed, so we need to work with the School, Cheshire East Council and Holmes Chapel Parish Council and others to get some agreement on the need for a crossing before we have any serious injuries or worse. So, if you have experience of driving projects that need a bit of determination and tact, and you have a bit of spare time, your support could be of great assistance to the Partnership.

Another activity that we started in 2024 was the **Harry's Home Village Guided Tours**. News of our tours literally went global reaching an audience of 1.9 billion people, which resulted in the Partnership conducting over 45 guided tours during the summer of 2024. We would like to repeat this exercise this year and will be looking to get the ball rolling very soon. But we need to consult with all parties involved and see how things can be improved to make visits to Holmes Chapel even more memorable for Harry's fans.

In the summer we are looking to organise the stalls at the **Holmes Chapel Village Fair** at the Victoria Club in July and will be looking for support from volunteers on the day.

And finally, if you love nature and being outdoors, our **Friends of Dane Meadow** subgroup meet once a month at 10am for an hour - usually on the second Tuesday. Jobs to be done are raking paths and keeping them clear, looking after the new trees and cutting back vegetation. Just bring yourself along appropriately dressed (nettles, thistles and bare legs are not a happy combination!) and with some gardening gloves.

Santa Sleigh Update

Another busy year for Holmes Chapel groups with Santa's Sleigh!

For over 40 years Santa's Sleigh has been a well-loved tradition of Christmas in Holmes Chapel and the surrounding villages. On December evenings, local voluntary groups bring Santa and his sleigh around the neighbourhood so that excited children can meet Santa at their doorstep.



The sleigh visits as many roads and estates as it can across Holmes Chapel, Cranage, Brereton and Goostrey throughout December - regardless of the weather, which was a bit wet on occasions!

The sleigh first appeared at the Holmes Chapel Christmas Market on 1st December and then had 15 nights going house-to-house round the local area, along with three Primary School visits plus an appearance at Lowe's Farm Shop with some real reindeer!.

Santa and his elves were provided by a different local group for each outing. The money collected is pooled and divided between the groups. This provides a welcome boost to funds for many, whilst others choose to donate their share of the money to local charities such as the Alzheimer's Society, Middlewich Food bank and St. Luke's Hospice. Groups involved this year were:

Peter Whiers, Holmes Chapel Partnership Chair, said:

"Seeing smiling faces and getting thanked by children, parents and older people on our route makes the hard work of running the sleigh all worthwhile. We can only keep the sleigh going with help from volunteers each night, and the groups who take Santa round the village.

The money raised by the sleigh runs supports many local causes, as well as keeping the sleigh up and running, so thank you to everyone in Holmes Chapel and the surrounding area who made a donation this year.

The Partnership team are extremely grateful to Will Burnham and the Shed Crew, who played a major part in the sleigh rebuild in 2022 and continue to offer help to keep it on the road. Our thanks also to Lowe's Farm for stabling the sleigh and reindeer through 2024, Hopley Tyres for supplying batteries to keep the sleigh lighting and sound system powered, and to Sam Dale & Sons for looking after it during December."

Olympians Open Gold Phone Box!

On 3rd August 2024 at the Paris Olympics, Holmes Chapel's Tom and Emily Ford won gold and bronze in the men and women rowing 8s. It has been 116 years since siblings have won medals in the same Olympic Games and the Parish Council wished to provide a permanent reminder of this exceptional achievement. To that end, on Friday 10th January, the Parish Council was delighted to welcome Tom and Emily Ford, and their family, to the village to officially open the phone box outside Mandeville's - painted gold in honour of their tremendous sporting success.




It was a beautiful blue-sky day and the gold phone box glistened as we gathered outside to watch Tom and Emily officially open the phone box with the cutting of a gold ribbon. This phone box is a distinctive feature of our village, made even more important by being a location for one of our defibrillators. Following the ribbon cutting ceremony, attendees moved to St Luke's Church Hall. Our Chair, Cllr Chris Jackson talked about his personal history of rowing describing how difficult both physically and mentally the sport is. He shared how proud Holmes Chapel was of our Olympians and what a privilege it was for the Parish Council to honour their achievements in this way. We then showed a short video highlighting Tom and Emily's achievements.

One of the aims of this event was to inspire our young people. Members of our Youth Council had been invited and they were given the opportunity to interview Tom and Emily. Through their interesting questions, we got a glimpse into the sheer commitment, resilience and drive needed to excel in your chosen sport. We also got a taste of just what it is like to win an Olympic medal and some of the obstacles they have had to overcome throughout their sporting careers. Following the interviews, we presented Tom and Emily with the banners that had been produced and displayed in the village back in August.

Alongside our MP Sarah Russell, Ward Councillors, Parish Councillors and representatives from community organisations, we were also delighted that representatives from our local primary schools were also able to attend and have the opportunity to meet Tom and Emily and take a look at their medals.

Parish Council News

Parish Council Budget 2025/26



At the meeting of the Council on 12th December 2024, the budget for the coming year was set. This year the council agreed an increase to the precept equating to an extra £3.51 per average (band d) household per year - resulting in a total income of £279,992.

We continue to provide many ongoing services for the village - examples including CCTV, Christmas lights and tree, the community centre, tree planting and St Luke's church floodlighting. In addition, the Council are constantly looking to make improvements in Holmes Chapel - next year the projects include installing outdoor gym equipment, looking at introducing a youth club, celebrating 80 years since VE Day and the annual Summer Celebration Weekend along with many more - for the full list refer to our 5 year plan for capital spending on our website.

New Artwork at Holmes Chapel Station

With the help of the local Community Rail group we successfully bid for funding from the Cross Rail Community Engagement Fund for the design, creation and installation of artwork by the artist Eamonn Murphy. The installation is due to take place at the end of February and we plan to unveil it on March 1st.

Holmes Chapel Railway Station Corner

Railway Closures 2025!



Network Rail has drawn our attention to our railway closing dates during 2025. Greek Street bridge is a two span railway bridge located just south of Stockport Railway Station, spanning the West Coast Main line on our Crewe to Manchester line. The bridge structure carries a major roundabout intersection in Stockport. This means that the replacement works will cause significant disruption to both the railway and highway network. The original bridge was constructed in 1958 and it has now reached the end of its life and needs to be replaced. Network rail say the new bridge will ensure train services along the west coast mainline are safer and more reliable for years to come.

The existing structure, which is made up of about 200 concrete beams, will be demolished with the road above it, then rebuilt. Before the bridge is replaced Network Rail will be undertaking some preparation works including the installation of a temporary scaffolding bridge to allow for the diversion of utility services.

The project timeline – start on site works; 17th March 2025, road closure; 31st March 2025 to Spring 2026. The closure of Greek Street roundabout and nearby roads will mean that the road is closed for approximately one year. The railway closure timetable shows that the railway will be closed as follows:

Railway confirmed closures: 00.10 Saturday 19th April 2025 to 05.00 Tuesday 22nd April 2025 **4 DAYS**; 00.10 Saturday 2nd August 2025 to 05.00 Saturday 23rd August 2025 **21 DAYS**; 00.10 Saturday 11th October 2025 to 05.00 Monday 13th October **3 DAYS**.

There are also three days proposed (but not as yet confirmed) between the 25th December 2025 and the 27th December 2025. Network rail is currently working with their train operating partners and Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) to coordinate alternative transport options – details are not available at the moment.

Home Grown in Holmes Chapel



Most gardeners are getting itchy fingers.
They really want to get sowing those little seeds that promise so much for the coming year. At Home Grown in Holmes Chapel we are so fortunate as Four Oaks nursery gave us lots of packets of vegetable and flower seeds for free. These will be used when we have our first dig of the year.

On Saturday, 1st March, we will not only be having our first dig of the season, but will be hosting our annual seed sowing session. We will be based in the Precinct, not at the Health Centre. Please don't park in the Health Centre car park for this event. We don't want anyone to get a parking fine.

Alzheimer

As usual, we will give each person two seed trays. After filling each cell with seedling compost, you put one or two seeds in every compartment, cover with the compost and insert a label. Then you simply take the trays home and place them on a warm window sill and watch the seedlings come up. In May just bring back one tray to Home Grown and we will plant them in our beds for the whole community to enjoy. Everything is provided for you, trays, seedling compost, seeds and labels. There is no cost to you. All we ask is that you bring us back one tray of seedlings.

Because of the Health Centre parking fines, our annual plant swap will now be at the **George and Dragon** on 17th May. You will be able to park, for free, in their car park for this event. Martin, Simon and their team are looking forward to hosting this community event and we hope that lots of you come along.

Watch out for our display in the Tesco window from 4th March.

Carol Singing - Thank You

You may recall the appeals made through a previous Partnership news letter for our Community to especially support the 2024 Christmas Eve Community Carol Singing on the patio at the George and Dragon. The reason being was for us to acknowledge one of the legacies of Eileen Lomax who twenty three years ago had the inspiration to bring our Community together to help to celebrate Christmas.

Our Community definitely turned out, it was estimated that 2024 might have been the busiest year yet. In memory of Eileen, this year the collection was for the Alzheimer's Society and we wish to thank those who gave so generously through the bucket collections or online and special thanks to the George and Dragon who made the total donation up to £1000.



When Eileen moved away from Holmes Chapel thirteen years ago, she passed on the organisation of the event to her friends and this year, Eileen's family were delighted to receive a video showing them that the tradition of Community Carol singing in Holmes Chapel on Christmas Eve has continued.

Stroke Survivors Support Group

Stroke Survivors was created in 2018 in direct response to the lack of support for people who have survived a stroke.



We have 4 groups which are set up to provide this support and supply information for stroke survivors in Crewe, Sandbach, Alsager and Nantwich.

We empower stroke survivors to recover, reclaim and rebuild their lives after stroke. We gained charity status in July 2024 of which we are very proud.

Our aim is to eliminate social isolation for people who are at their most vulnerable. We provide a safe and relaxing environment, peer support and practical tools to help rebuild confidence and develop new ways of communicating.

We give emotional support, assistance with wellbeing and the opportunity to make new friends with people who have experienced the trauma of a stroke. We also encourage essential trips/events/guests as part of a survivor's wellbeing, future development and social contact.

Our provision is different to other groups as we provide a dedicated quiet location to enable our Survivors to hear and concentrate on engaging activities without interruption - an essential part of healing. The range of activities we deliver follow key guidelines that are found to benefit and encourage Stroke Survivors with their unique difficulties. We want them to feel that they matter and are valued as members of our community.

We are starting a group in Holmes Chapel! The first session will be on Monday 7th April from 11.00 – 13.00 at the Victoria Club

We are really excited to be able to bring our group to Holmes Chapel but we would appreciate any help and support that you could provide with spreading the word to your community. We are an independent group so receive no statutory funding so would appreciate any financial assistance to help us get off the ground too.

We were also part of the nuclear deterrent at the time. My talk is highly informative, drawing from personal experience about the challenges we faced! I completed 450 Carrier Deck landings by day and 35 by night"

Improved Footpath!






Residents of, and visitors to, Cranage can now enjoy a significantly improved walking experience thanks to recent upgrades to one of our local footpaths – the section running up behind Glebe Farm off the A50, which also forms part of the Dane Valley Way. The previously muddy and slippery trail has been widened and resurfaced, making it accessible and easy to navigate all year-round. The project, initiated by the Parish Council, aimed to address concerns about safety and accessibility along the popular walking route. With the new surface, walkers and joggers can now traverse the footpath comfortably, regardless of the season. "It is great to see this improvement come to fruition," said Councillor Hocknell, a member of the Parish Council. "The footpath is an essential part of our community, and we wanted to ensure that everyone can enjoy it safely."

The upgrades include a wider pathway, along with a durable surface designed to withstand varying weather conditions. This enhancement not only promotes outdoor activity but also encourages community engagement as residents explore the beautiful surroundings. The project was funded by the Parish Council for the benefit of our community. As the seasons change, this upgraded footpath promises to be a valuable asset for all who enjoy the great outdoors.

News from Friends of Goostrey Station

Joseph Harrop - half a century working on the railway

What a lovely surprise! Last year Lynn Gerber contacted Friends of Goostrey Station through our website <u>friendsofgoostreystation.org</u> because she thought we might be interested in a photo of her grandfather Joseph Harrop. Of course, we are!



Joseph was born in March 1895 and started work as a porter at Goostrey Station in January 1911. In the photo, Joseph is seated on the left of the bench. But who are the other men? Could they be Mr Lockett, Mr Brandreth, Mr Thompson or Mr Wilde who were living in station cottages at the time of the 1911 census? In September 1914, at the start of WW1, Lynn's grandfather volunteered for the Royal Marines and he was wounded at Gallipoli. On his return to civilian life at the end of the war, Joseph trained as a signalman at Eccles and he was subsequently employed at several stations on the Crewe-Manchester line. When the system was modernised in 1959, he changed job and became a porter again.

After WW2, Joseph received a commendation for his devotion to duty in Goostrey Home Guard. In 1927 he had joined the St John Ambulance and the training he received allowed him to lead the ambulance section.

On his 65th birthday, Joseph was given a gold wrist watch by British Rail. When he retired in October 1961, officials presented him with a long-service certificate and he received a clock from the staff at Goostrey, Holmes Chapel and Sandbach stations.

Joseph's granddaughter Lynn has provided FoGS with a precious glimpse into the life of someone who worked for half a century on the local railway. She described him as a lovely man who was well respected. He was an active member of the labour party and, as a keen gardener, he was also secretary of the Allotment Association and the Gooseberry Society. She added that 'it's a really nice feeling to know that my grandfather's story is still being remembered'.


