Launch of Harry's Home Village Self Guided Tours

I am delighted to announce the introduction of self-guided maps for Harry Styles fans visiting the village this year. This innovative initiative comes in response to the ongoing demand for the Harry's Home Village Tour.

The self-guided maps are designed to cater to Harry Styles fans who visit Holmes Chapel on a whim, ensuring they can fully enjoy the village and its rich heritage. By providing these maps, visitors are empowered to independently explore the village's many connections to the internationally acclaimed pop star. This flexible format builds on the success of last year's guided tours, which were highly popular but sometimes unable to meet the high demand, leaving some fans disappointed.

The transition from guided tours to self-guided maps represents an evolution in how the Holmes Chapel Partnership engages with visitors. This change is not only practical but also aligns with the broader trends in tourism, where flexibility and independence are increasingly valued by travellers. By offering self-guided maps, the Partnership will continue to highlight safe walking routes, discourage graffiti and support the village's numerous independent businesses. Marketing Cheshire Tourism Awards 2024/2025

On March 6th Marketing Cheshire held their Tourism Awards ceremony in Chester Cathedral. The awards celebrate the people and businesses behind Cheshire and Warrington's tourist sector which contributes £3.41 billion to the region's economy and attracts more than 50 million visitors to the area every year. The shortlist for the awards was announced in November when Holmes Chapel Partnership's Harry's Home Village Tour (HHVT) was nominated as a finalist in three categories: best Tourism Marketing Project of the Year, Best Experience and New Tourism Business of the Year.

Artwork at Holmes Chapel Station Unveiled

On March 1st the sun shone and the artwork at Holmes Chapel Station was officially unveiled. Graham Blake, our Station Manager and Tony Wright of The Friends of Holmes Chapel Station did the honours after Peter Whiers and Hazel Sutcliffe of Holmes Chapel Partnership who co-ordinated the project had said a few words of thanks to all those who made it happen.







The artists Eamonn Murphy who produced the stunning images of Holmes Chapel and Victoria Holland who added the cheery image of Harry Styles were in attendance as well as representatives of the funders, the Parish Council and local fans of the musician. The BBC came along to film and interview and Holmes Chapel once again featured on the regional North West tonight news programme!

The funding for this art project was provided by the Cross Country Community Engagement Fund

with support from Northern, the second largest train operator in the UK, with 2,500 services a day to more than 500 stations across the North of England. Additional funding came from the Community Cinema which unfortunately could no longer operate after the film supplier's business closed down. We are very grateful to them for funding this project and to Tony Wright for putting in the grant application to Northern.

We hope you agree that the pieces of artwork brighten up the station for us all and not just for the Harry fans who enjoy having their photo taken with his portrait.

The route round the Dane Meadow is approximately 2km, with disabled access and accessible routes available.



With two groups following two different routes that will both take you to either of our Primary Schools, our aim is to highlight the difficulties faced when walking to school, or anywhere, in our village.

We continue to highlight our concerns about narrow pavements, speeding traffic and a lack of safe crossing points to the Highways team at Cheshire East. The two railway bridges present a challenge to pedestrians of any age! We have long campaigned for a crossing on Macclesfield Road, which has to be crossed to get to the Hermitage School from Saltersford Gardens and the new Victoria Mills estate. There isn't even any indication to incoming motorists that this is a school route, despite our requests for new signage warning of the nearby school.



The event coincides with the 80th Anniversary of VE Day so please come dressed with some red, white and blue accessories.

Report on Annual Parish Meeting 2025



VE Day 80 'A Shared Moment of Celebration'

VE Day or 'Victory in Europe Day' took place on Tuesday 8th May 1945 and marked the official end of World War II with Germany formally surrendering.

On that day millions of people celebrated the Allied victory in Europe, with street parties, singing and dancing. At 3pm on that day, Winston Churchill made a national radio broadcast announcing that war had ended in Europe. The Royal Family led by King George VI appeared on the balcony of Buckingham Palace to wave at the crowd below. The King also gave a radio address paying tribute to those who lost their lives and calling for lasting peace.

8th May marks 80 years since this momentous day and we will be celebrating this in the village of Holmes Chapel. Grateful thanks to Sam Dale's and Morreys for generously donating the gas for the beacon and to our local fire officers for supporting the lighting of the beacon.

Centenary Milestone: Holmes Chapel Cricket Club Joins Cheshire Women's and Girls' Cricket Leagues

Holmes Chapel Cricket Club has announced its entry into the Cheshire Women's Cricket League and the Cheshire Girls Cricket League for the 2025 season. This marks an exciting new chapter in the club's centenary year, as it proudly expands its involvement in women's and girls' cricket.

The club's amateur women's team is largely made up of mums and sisters of boys who play in the club's junior teams with no prior cricket experience. After starting to learn the basics of



the game last summer, the women have made good progress during winter indoor training as they prepare for the League.

Natasha Tottey-Gee, a member of the women's team, solicitor, and busy mum of four commented: "It's amazing to see how far we've come in such a short time, having only started last summer and that's all down to our incredibly patient coaches who make sure every session is full of fun. We know we're not about to win the league, but we come together every Sunday because it's a great group of ladies, who all want to be active, enjoy ourselves and progress our women's team together."

Sponsored by Sibelco, Holmes Chapel's women's team is being coached by members of the men's squad, alongside Lucy Pearson, a former England cricketer and village resident. Lucy represented England from 1996 to 2005 and was twice named England Women's Cricketer of the Year. Her deep insights into the women's game have been invaluable, guiding the team through its early stages with confidence, enthusiasm, and a focus on development.

Paul Cudby, head coach of the women's team, shared his excitement: "It's been an absolute pleasure watching this team develop their skills to a level where they can debut in the League this season. Lucy's insights into the women's game and her light-hearted approach has created an environment where the team can relax and develop their skills without any pressure. This team's upbeat mentality is its greatest strength, and I'm confident that will be a key asset in the upcoming season."

With International Women's Day just around the corner, Holmes Chapel Cricket Club is excited to be part of the broader movement of women and girls embracing sports and championing this year's theme: Accelerate Action.

"I'm proud of our club's commitment to elevating female participation in sport," commented Lucy Pearson. "Many of our players have spent hours at the clubhouse, cheering on their children or siblings, and now they can step onto the field and discover the joy of cricket firsthand. Playing a team sport offers tremendous mental and physical health benefits and, as these women have discovered, cricket is a wonderful way to improve both."



Following the success of the women's team, Holmes Chapel Cricket Club has this year formed a girls' team for players aged 8-11, further strengthening its commitment to developing young cricketers in the community.

The girl's Dynamos team has entered a soft ball league this season and is trained on Friday evenings by members of the women's team, moving to Thursdays in April. Both female teams are actively looking for new members, no experience required, to help grow women's cricket in Holmes Chapel.

Based at The Victoria Club in Holmes

Tom Ford, Holmes Chapel's Olympic Rower, in the news again!

After winning a gold medal in the rowing eights at the Paris Olympics, Tom Ford headed off to study for an MBA in Cambridge. The world class university is famous for many things, one of which is the annual Boat Race between it and Oxford. Who better to add to your team than a gold medallist, you would think?

There is great rivalry between the two universities



and a spat has developed about the eligibility criteria for the rowers. Oxford University Boat Club (which has only won the race once in the last six years) is creating waves! They claim that the post graduate teaching qualification (PGCE) is a diploma and not a degree. This would render the under 23 rowing champion Matt Heywood ineligible to row for Cambridge, as well as two squad members of the women's team.

In a separate development gold medallist Tom has also been prevented from rowing for Cambridge on April 13th because of the so-called 12 year rule, which stops anyone competing if it was more than 12 years since they started an undergraduate degree course. Tom enrolled for his undergraduate degree at Newcastle University in 2011 so he has, quite literally, just missed the boat. The rule was agreed by the two boat clubs after the double Olympic champion James Cracknell rowed for Cambridge in 2019 at the age of 46. So despite having competed in a number of test races with the Cambridge crew, he will not be rowing in the 2025 Oxford versus Cambridge Boat Race.



Holmes Chapel Railway Station Corner by Tony Wright - April 2025

The first time in 100 years!

If you travel on one of the half-hourly trains from Holmes Chapel Railway Station to Manchester Piccadilly Railway Station, on arrival there are four exits. Take the escalator down to the Fairfield Street exit - this exit is situated towards the southwest section of the station. It leads to Fairfield Street, where you'll find the station's taxi rank. Cross the road at the traffic lights, turn left and take the short walk to the D bus stop, under the bridge supporting platforms 13 and 14.



This bus route serves the Whitworth Art Gallery which is showing some of JMW Turner's lesser known work as part of the 250th anniversary of his birth.

The exhibition is very special - it includes the prints from Turner's celebrated Liber Studiorum collection. It is the first time in 100 years that the entire set of 71 published prints has been on display!

Joseph Mallord William Turner (1775-1851) is still one of Britain's most renowned landscape painters and he continues to inspire generations of artists. The exhibition explores his remarkable series of landscape prints, the Liber Studiorum; 'Book of Studies'. These were published in fourteen parts from from 1807 to 1819, when he was at the height of his fame.

The prints were made in collaboration with a new generation of mezzotint engravers and elevated and transformed the print medium. Turner made topographical studies gathered on his sketching tours across the United Kingdom and Europe. The artist created the Liber Studiorum prints in collaboration with some eleven professional mezzotint engravers. Turner engraved several of the plates himself and meticulously supervised the work of those not engraved by his own hand. "I laboured at my plate and with the painter's aid was placed among my brothers scrapers to become an artist"; Thomas Goff Lupton, engraver 1848.

To the right is an image of the print 'Solway Moss' by J.M.W Turner (artist and etcher) and Thomas Goff Lupton (engraver). The impending storm is perfectly rendered through the oppressive dark clouds which give way to clear sky beyond. Turner believed that the prints reflect the five categories of landscape painting; pastoral, mountainous, marine, historical and architectural.

The set of published prints are displayed alongside the Whitworth's celebrated watercolour paintings, offering a



fresh perspective on Turner. If you are interested I hope you have the opportunity to visit, I have been twice so far! The exhibition runs until the 2nd November 2025.

Snippets of News!

Speed limits again!

Cheshire East Highways is carrying out a speed survey between 26th March and 3rd April on Middlewich Road - probably the section between the motorway roundabout and the start of the 40mph limit. It apparently involves a lane closure. Hopefully this will lead to an extension of the 40mph limit so that it starts as soon as motorists leave the roundabout. Given that there are houses whose owners need to access their drives on this stretch, it seems only logical. Another argument in favour of this is that the 40mph limit begins as soon as you leave the roundabout on the Middlewich side.

Could this lead to the current 40mph sign being converted to a 30mph? This would be another logical step in favour of safety and pedestrians, as the pedestrian crossing would then be in a 30mph limit as opposed to a 40mph limit.



Council Tax

We have all had our Council Tax bills by now for 2025-2026 and are probably relieved that the increase is 5% and not 10%.

Looking over the borough it is interesting to see the cheapest and the most expensive

places to live. Taking the cost for a Band D property (sort of half way between Band A and Band H) The most expensive is Nantwich at £2414* and the cheapest are Macclesfield Forest, Wildboarclough at £2254 and Little Warford ,that comes in at £2254 as well.

Holmes Chapel is £2348 which makes it more expensive than the surrounding villages but we do have facilities we can walk to and they have to pay for car parking to use them - or get on their bike!

Brereton £2285 (this argument of lower Council Tax was used to try and persuade the residents of Bluebell Green to stay in Brereton during the attempt to change the boundary!)

Cranage £2288, Goostrey £2305, Twemlow £2291

HHVT goes Self Guided

As reported elsewhere, Holmes Chapel Partnership, alongside its PR team from TMC Strategic Communications, won New Tourism Business of the Year and were highly commended for Best Tourism Marketing Project of the Year.

As a small volunteer-driven organisation, the Partnership is proud of the positive impact the guided tours had on Holmes Chapel. However, it has been decided for the 2025 season to offer self-guided maps instead, allowing visitors to independently explore Holmes Chapel's rich heritage and its many connections to Harry. This flexible format allows fans to explore the village at their own pace, building on the success of last year's guided tours and aligning with the Partnership's goal of highlighting safe walking routes, dissuading graffiti and supporting the village's many independent businesses.

Chair Peter Whiers, explained:: "The influx of Harry Styles fans to Holmes Chapel remains strong and, while the guided tours were popular, some fans were disappointed last year when tours were unavailable or sold out. The self-guided maps ensure every visitor can enjoy their time here, regardless of when they arrive. Our voluntary partners at the train station and Sam Dale & Sons will continue to offer a warm welcome and local insights to fans, as I'm sure will the wider village community."

It looks as though Samuel Smith's Old Brewery would like it to be open as they are advertising for a management couple. Are they going to have the chance to get a viable business up and running?



Samuel Smith's Brewery has some very particular rules:

Nearly all licensees in tied pubs are tenants, enabling them to live in the pub and make their own business decisions, so long as they sell the brewery's beer. The managers of Samuel Smith's pubs are direct, salaried employees and do not enjoy the freedoms traditionally afforded to landlords.

Everything is centrally mandated by the brewery. Not just the beer, which is usual, but the decor and the food as well – even down to the crisps!

Most noticeably the pubs must be a mobile, tablet and laptop free zone – that is the rule for the customers, although they can pay by mobile! Is

this policy viable nowadays when our phones serve as calendars, maps and a general source of information? No one wants people to be glued to a screen instead of engaging in civilised conversation in the pub, but such an authoritarian approach is a complete mismatch with a place where people go to relax – the idea is to attract customers not put them off!

It is a shame for the people who have tried to make a go of The Swan and for the community in general that it has closed. If another potential management couple comes along, let's hope they are given the opportunity to run the pub successfully.
